I started reading comics at a young age because my Great Uncle, a World War II Army veteran, had a collection of them. His comics weren't bagged or boarded, let alone encased in plastic. They were just in piles in his room. He was not worried about value; he only wanted us kids to get the same enjoyment out of them that he did. He didn't read many superhero comics; mostly *Richie Rich, Archie*, and *Sad Sack*. No, there weren't any million-dollar books that we read to pieces – just a few hundred that were read for fun. Those comics gave me priceless hours of enjoyment as I read them on the floor while my grandparents and Great Uncle watched Lawrence Welk on their television. Reading those comics was one of the best parts of visiting my grandparents, and most importantly, it introduced me to the world of comics.

As I grew older, I started my own collection. My first full-time job was across the street from a comic shop. The owner came into the restaurant where I worked every day for lunch, and then he played *Ms. Pac-Man* in the bar before going back to work. As luck would have it, my co-worker who gave me a ride home was also a comic fan. Every Wednesday, we stopped at the shop across the street for new comics. When I moved on from that job, my collecting paused, but that wouldn't last for long.

A few years later, I started helping a high-school friend sell his comics at a convention called SpringCon, hosted at the old Thunderbird hotel in Bloomington. I arrived (late of course) to the convention and was shocked to see the long line of people waiting to get in. I went to my buddy's table and had a blast! Meeting people, joking around, and best of all – I was paid in comics! My life would never be the same.

Every Spring and Fall after that, I was at the comic convention helping my buddy sell comics and making lifelong friends – not only of fellow vendors, but of volunteers and creators as well. I looked forward to the conventions, especially the two-day show. I stayed in a hotel for the weekend, and I was able to see out-of-town vendors and creators who only came in for the two-day show. Fast forward a bit, and in addition to helping my buddy, I was volunteering with setup and teardown of the convention itself. I was amazed by the passion of the organizers and volunteers. As the conventions grew and moved to the MN State Fairgrounds, I started vending myself. That was a blast too! It was a lot of fun and work. I love it. Over time, the convention suffered due to loss; first Nick Post (Dominic Postiglione) and then Big Mike (Mike Edmundson). When COVID-19 hit, that was nearly the end.

In early 2023, a small group of long-time volunteers decided to take over leadership and continue the tradition. As a 501(c)(3) non-profit, we are dedicated to putting on two conventions a year, promoting comics as an art form, hosting auctions to benefit other charities that support the comic book industry such as The Hero Initiative, and giving back to the surrounding communities through our event food drives. Our mission is to make MNCBA events the best comic book conventions in the Midwest: shows focused on comic books and comic creators, "Where there is something for everyone, and everyone is welcome!"

Comics are a world that has given me hours of reading pleasure, many lifelong friendships, and even a couple bucks. I've done everything in comics but draw them. I have purchased them, sold them at conventions, volunteered at conventions, wrote one, and now I am part of a team that puts on a convention. I have enjoyed all these experiences.

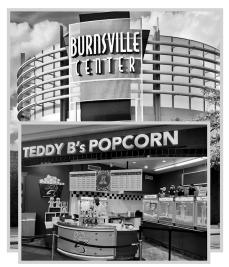

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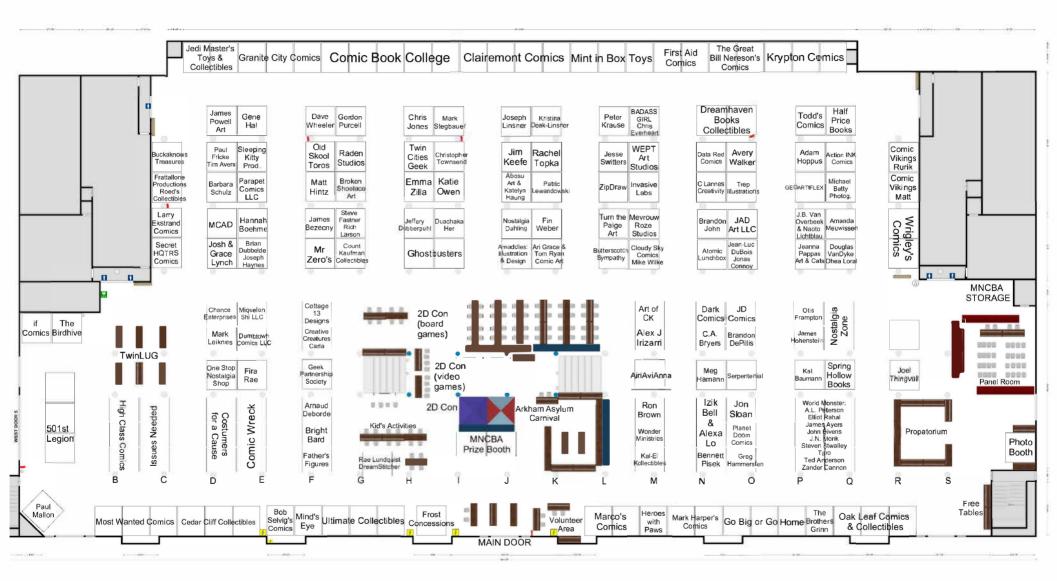
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MNCBA: An Enduring Convention

An Interview with Minneapolis College of Art and Design (MCAD) Professor Barbara Schulz

What is the history of the comics program at MCAD?

In the late 1990's, the Minneapolis College of Art and Design responded to years of requests from their students for a Comic Illustration class. The popularity of this course quickly led them into developing a full four-year BFA Major in Comic Art. From its humble beginnings it has developed into one of the most popular degrees within the college, attracting students from across the country. While there are still only a handful of BFA Comic degrees, MCAD was the third in the nation to develop a dedicated field of comic art study.

Who are some of the best-known graduates of the comics program at MCAD?

There are so many of our Alumni that have done well after graduating, across all genres of comic publishing to animation, so many, but here are just a few that are regularly seen active throughout the field:

Madeline McGrane: The *Accursed Vampire* series (Quill Tree Books), *The Unbeatable Squirrel Girl* (Marvel Comics), and prolific self-publisher.

Rosemary Valerio O'Connell: *Laura Dean Keeps Breaking up with Me* (First Second Books), DC Comics, and BOOM! Studios. Winner of two Eisner awards and four Ignatz awards.

Ryan Kelly: Prolific Penciler for DC, Marvel, and Image Comics. Perhaps best known for *Lucifer* (Vertigo/DC) and *Local* (Image Comics).

Brent Schoonover: Prolific artist for DC, Marvel, and Dark Horse Comics.

Chan Chau: *THE BABY-SITTERS CLUB*; #10 Kristy and the Snobs & #12 Jessi's Secret Language, and Minh Lê's original graphic novel ENLIGHTEN ME. ELEMENTS: FIRE, HEARTWOOD, JIM HENSON'S THE STORYTELLER: SIRENS. Daytime Emmy winning show Danger & Eggs.

How should prospective students of the comics program at MCAD prepare, and what can they expect as part of their education there?

Good questions! Well, to prepare, I would say keep drawing! MCAD really stresses accepting students with a portfolio showcasing their artistic abilities. The portfolio does not have to be comics at all, it just needs to show your creative abilities and skill sets. Interested people can check out MCAD's website for more detailed information. The Admissions Office is great at helping people with the portfolio process. <u>https://www.mcad.edu/</u>

In regards what to expect within the program, a student leaving the program will have:

• Acquire the skills and knowledge necessary for a professional career in comics which include collaborating, writing, presenting, and producing. As well as gain knowledge of professional practice and ethics in relation to culture and market.

• Be able to fluidly use sequential language and concepts, develop strong process work, and learn traditional craft, contemporary craft, digital formats. (We have several alumni publishing very successfully on WebToons!)

Experience conventional and experimental aspects of comic storytelling.

AND they will do this by working with Professors who are all published comic professionals!
